Introduction

The 9th Grade Success Grant is designed to provide funding to local education agencies to improve the 9th-grade student experience to ensure that students enrolled in 9th grade develop the skills they need to successfully persist to tenth grade on time and ultimately graduating from high school and launching successful careers. Applicants commit to implementing the key components of the 9th Grade Success model, based on the Center for High School Success Roadmap, and should use funds to support implementation in each of the following categories:

- **Timely, Actionable Data**
- **Highly Effective 9th Grade Success Teams**
- **Proactive & Data Driven Interventions**
- **Comprehensive System of 9th Grade Transition Supports**
- **High Quality Instruction**

Title IV-A in School Support and Improvement will provide focus, coordination, research, and leadership to assist local education agencies in implementing efforts to reduce the dropout rate and increase graduation and completion rates and levels of student engagement and re-engagement related to the goals of the 9th Grade Success Grant Program.

Eligible Applicants

Local Education Agencies (LEAs) are eligible to apply for this opportunity and will identify the school(s) that will participate.

Eligibility: A graduation rate of less than 85% for the last two school years.

Available grant funding will be distributed to LEAs with school(s) demonstrating high need based on the following priority criteria:

- In the last year, the school was within the lowest 25% of schools in four-year graduation rate
- Is in a rural area as defined by ADE
- Is funding a new 9th grade transition program that has not been previously funded by the LEA
- Were previously funded with the 9th Grade Success Grant and completed a successful program

Available Funds and Duration of Grant

Approximately \$1 million is available for the 2024-2025 school year. Note that future funding levels are not guaranteed. Current statute indicates that the grant will expire June 30, 2025. Future funding levels are contingent on annual appropriations by the State Legislature and a change for continuation of the grant.

Grants will be awarded for a one-year implementation term in the 2024-2025 fiscal year.

- Grants will focus on school and district training, coaching, and capacity building to support the implementation of 9th Grade Success components.
 - o Approximately \$1,000,000 is available
 - o Grants will be awarded to approximately 20 schools
 - Applicants may request up to \$50,000 per school for 2024-2025, maximum of 5 schools per LEA
 - o Carryover is not available for this grant
 - This is a reverting state grant, and funds are expected to be expended by June 30, 2025

Allowable Use of Funds

LEAs that receive a grant under the program commit to implementing the 9th Grade Success Grant program components and must use the monies to support this implementation. These components fall under five general categories from the Center for High School Success Roadmap and are listed below:

1. Timely, Actionable Data:

- Provide data access
- Develop data literacy

2. Highly Effective 9th Grade Success Teams:

- Establish foundational structures and conditions for 9th grade on-track work
- Establish systems and processes for operationalizing the work of the 9th grade team
- Systematize 9th grade success by recruiting and engaging all stakeholders

3. Proactive & Data Driven Interventions:

- Cultivate a growth mindset in adults
- Establish data-driven intervention and referral systems and processes
- Implement proactive and high leverage intervention strategies

4. Comprehensive System of 9th Grade Transition Supports:

- Create a personalized and supportive environment for 9th grade students
- Provide early preparation for high school entry
- Provide proactive supports

5. High Quality Instruction:

- Implement fair grading practices
- Develop learning-centered professional communities
- Develop student-centered learning communities

Examples of Allowable Expenses:

- A vendor or expert coach that provides 9th grade transition support
- A grant program coordinator or 9th-grade success leader who leads and organizes the work of the grant and supports 9th-grade staff and students
- Intervention curriculum, training, or coaching for 9th-grade instructional staff
- Time for staff to plan and meet to review student data, plan interventions, and instructional support
- Professional development, conferences, or training for 9th-grade staff that supports implementation of 9th-grade success components

Examples of Unallowable expenses:

- Capital equipment or capital improvements such as upgrades or improvements to buildings, utilities or IT infrastructure, or construction
- Maintenance
- Gift cards, gift certificates, cash awards, gas for students' personal vehicles, personal gifts, door prizes, etc.

Evaluation and Reporting

Each LEA awarded a grant is required to provide information to ADE concerning the implementation of the 9th Grade Success Program and the evaluation of impact. Applicants must have, or acquire, the capacity to complete the evaluation and reports.

All applicants receiving grant funding are required to submit to ADE annually:

- Fiscal reports during full year implementation and an annual completion report (CR).
- At least one performance report (e.g., numbers of students served, student outcomes such as on-track rate and course passage rate, progress on performance measures, implementation progress, etc.) in the 2024-2025 school year (EMAC).

Applicants receiving grant funding are required to participate in state evaluations as needed.

Data Privacy

ADE takes seriously its obligation to protect the privacy of student and educator Personally Identifiable Information (PII) collected, used, shared, and stored.

Documents submitted as part of the application must not contain any personally identifiable student or educator information including names, identification numbers, or anything that could identify an individual. All data should be referenced/included in the aggregate and the aggregate counts should be redacted to remove small numbers under n=16 for students or n=5 for educators.

Information reported to ADE in relation to grant activities is not confidential and is subject to public request. Awarded grantees should ensure reported information does not contain Personally Identifiable Information (PII) or confidential information.

Application Assistance and Intent to Apply

If interested in applying for this funding opportunity, submit the Grants Management application in GME starting on Friday, November 1, 2024.

Review Process and Notification

Applications will be reviewed by ADE staff to ensure they contain all the required components.

Note: This is a competitive process – applicants must score at least 22 points out of the 42 possible narrative points to be approved for funding. There is no guarantee that applying will result in funding or funding at the requested level. All award decisions are final. Applicants that do not meet the qualifications may reapply for future grant opportunities.

Submission Process and Deadline

Completed applications (including all required elements outlined below) must be submitted by Sunday, December 1, 2024, by 11:59 pm.

Incomplete or late applications will not be considered.
