# If a family is living in motel, will they always qualify as homeless?

"The term "homeless children and youths"—

(A) means individuals who **lack** a fixed, regular, and **adequate** nighttime residence (within the meaning of section 11302(a)(1) of this title); and includes

(i) children and youths who are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason; are **living in motels**, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds **due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations**; are living in emergency or transitional shelters; or are abandoned in hospitals;

(iv) migratory children (as such term is defined in section 6399 of title 20) who qualify as homeless for the purposes of this part because the children are living in circumstances described in clauses (i) through (iii).

(42 U.S.C. § 11434)



Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Point in Time Count utilizes a **different definition** of

homelessness than the McKinney-

#### Vento Act

- Persons who are staying in a hotel or motel and paying for their stay using their own resources – not included
- Persons who are staying in a hotel or motel with voucher or other form of payment assistance from a homeless assistance provider -included



If refugee families receive housing support upon resettlement, how could a refugee student be identified as experiencing homelessness?

### **Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR)** Eligible Populations

### Arizona Refugee Resettlement Data

A **refugee** is someone who has been forced to flee his or her country due to persecution, war, or violence. A **refugee** has a well-founded fear of persecution for reasons of race, religion, nationality, political opinion or membership in a particular social group.

- Refugee Arrivals for Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) '23: **5,882 individuals**
- Refugee Arrivals for Current FFY as of August 2024: **7,732 individuals** 
  - Projected Arrivals for FFY '24: 9,000 individuals
- Age Breakdown of Refugee Arrivals
  - Child (0-17): **31.1% of all arrivals** 
    - Average age: **8.8 years**
    - Projected total in FFY '24: **2,799 individuals**
- Projected Refugee Arrivals for FFY '25: **12,000 individuals**

## First 90 Days

Upon arrival in the U.S., refugees are provided essential services by resettlement agencies within the first 90 days, such as:

- limited cash assistance
- medical assistance
- housing
- English as a Foreign Language classes
- employment services
- enrollment in school

### Legal Definition of Homeless



**Fixed**: Stationary, permanent, not subject to change.



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**Regular**: Used on a predictable, routine, consistent basis.



**Adequate**: Lawfully and reasonably sufficient. Does it sufficiently meet the physical and psychological needs typically met in a home environment?

### **Refugee and Other Newcomer Students**

Refugee Student Support considers a "newcomer" student to be any immigrant student that has recently arrived in the United States.

#### A newcomer student may be a(n):

- Refugee/Asylee
- Humanitarian Parolee/Entrant
- Asylum-seeker
- Special Immigrant Visa (SIV) Holder
- Survivor of Torture or Victim of Trafficking
- Humanitarian Migrant

Newcomer students may **also** be classified as:

- experiencing homelessness
- unaccompanied
- a child in foster care
- an English language learner
- a migratory student

All newcomer students are entitled to a <u>free</u>, <u>accessible</u>, and <u>appropriate</u> <u>public education</u>, <u>regardless</u> of their actual or perceived immigration status.

### Is it a requirement for us to use the Arizona Student Residency Questionnaire and the Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youth that ADE provides?

#### "Functions of the Office of the **Coordinator** for the Education of Homeless Children and Youths established **in each State** shall **develop** and **carry out** the **State plan**."

(42 U.S.C. § 11432(f)(2))

### McKinney-Vento Act

"To properly **identify** homeless students in the State of Arizona, LEAs are **required** to use either an electronic or hard copy of the **Student Residency Housing Questionnaire**."

## **Related Statutory Requirements**

- Provision of both the Student Residency Questionnaire and The Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths is
  required at any time enrollment is requested and twice annually (42 U.S.C. § 11432 (g)(3)).
- LEAs may **not require completion** of the Student Residency Questionnaire for enrollment or eligibility determinations, as doing so may impose a barrier to the identification, immediate enrollment, and retention of students experiencing homelessness (42 U.S.C. § 11432 (g)(1)(I)).
- Parents, guardians, caregivers, and youth must be provided the opportunity to complete the Student Residency Questionnaire and access the accompanying Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths at any point in the year (42 U.S.C. § 11432 (g)(1)(I)).
- The Student Residency Questionnaire and accompanying Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths must be included in all versions and formats of an LEA's enrollment tool. This includes physical and online formats (42 U.S.C. § 11432 (g)(1)(I)).
- LEAs must ensure that parents, guardians, caregivers, and youth receive the Student Residency Questionnaire and accompanying Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths in a manner and form understandable to them, including, if necessary in their native language (42 U.S.C. § 11432 (e)(3)(C)(iii)).

"LEAs are required to **review** and **revise** policies and procedures to **remove barriers** to the identification of homeless children and youths, and the enrollment and retention of homeless children and youths in schools in the State, including **barriers** to **enrollment** and **retention** due to outstanding fees or fines, or absences."

## **Arizona Student Residency Questionnaire**

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#### Homeless Education

#### The Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths

The LEA/Charter District shall provide an educational environment that treats all students with dignity and respect. Every homeless student shall have access to the same free and appropriate educational opportunities as students who are not homeless. This commitment to the educational rights of homeless children, youth, and unaccompanied youth, applies to all services, programs, and activities provided or made available.

#### McKinney-Vento Definition of Homeless:

The term "homeless children and youth"— means individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence [42 U.S.C. § 11434a(2)].

A student may be considered eligible for services as a "Homeless Child or Youth" under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act if he or she is presently living in one of the following situations:

- sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason,
- living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations,
- · living in emergency or transitional shelters; or are abandoned in hospitals,
- have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings,
- living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings, or
- is a migratory child who qualifies as homeless for the purposes of this subtitle because the children are living in circumstances described above.

To remove educational barriers for children and youths experiencing homelessness, the McKinney-Vento Act mandates the following: **Immediate Enrollment**: Documentation and immunization records cannot serve as a barrier to the enrollment in school [42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(3)(C)].

School Selection and Maintained Enrollment: McKinney Vento eligible students have a right to select from the options outlined below. Students may remain enrolled in their selected schools for the duration of homelessness, and until the end of the academic year upon which they are permanently housed or enroll the child or youth in any public school that non-homeless students who live in the attendance area in which the child or youth is living are eligible to attend. [42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(3)(A), 42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(3)(B) and 42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(3)(I) (i)].

Transportation Services: McKinney-Vento eligible students attending their School of Origin have a right to transportation to and from the School of Origin [42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(1)(J)(iii)].

Participation in Programs: McKinney-Vento eligible students are guaranteed the right to services comparable to services offered to other students in the school [42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(4) & (6)(iii)].

Unaccompanied Youth Experiencing Homelessness: McKinney-Vento eligible students are guaranteed the right to immediate enrollment without proof of guardianship [42 U.S.C. §1432(g)(1)(H)(iv)].

Access to Extracurricular Activities: Removal of barriers to accessing academic and extracurricular activities for homeless students who meet relevant eligibility criteria [42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(1)(F)(iii)].

Dispute Resolution: If you disagree with school officials about enrollment, transportation, or fair treatment of a homeless child or youth, you may file a complaint with the school district [42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(3)(E)].

Appointment of a Local Homeless Liaison: The McKinney-Vento Act mandates the appointment of a local Homeless Liaison in every school district or local education agency (LEA) to ensure that homeless children and youth are enrolled in and have a full and equal opportunity to succeed in school [42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(1)(J)(ii) and U.S.C. §11432(g)(6)(A)].

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# What does the right to immediate enrollment entail?


"In general, the school selected in accordance with this paragraph shall **immediately enroll** the homeless child or youth, even if the child or youth—

(I) is **unable to produce records** normally required for enrollment, such as previous academic records, records of immunization and other required health records, proof of residency, or other documentation; or

(II) has missed application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness."

(42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(C)(i)

### McKinney-Vento Act



"The local educational agency serving each child or youth to be assisted under this part shall, **according to** the child's or youth's **best interest** –

(i) continue the child's or youth's **education** in the **school of origin for the duration of homelessness**...(or)

(ii) enroll the child or youth in any public school that nonhomeless students who live in the attendance area in which the child or youth is actually living are eligible to attend."

(42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(A))


### McKinney-Vento Act

"LEAs shall **provide written notice**, at the time any child or youth seeks **enrollment** in such school, and at least twice annually while the child or youth is enrolled in such school, to the parent or guardian of the child or youth (or, in the case of an unaccompanied youth, the youth) that **specifically states** the **choice** of **schools** homeless children and youths are **eligible** to **attend**."

(42 U.S.C. § 11432(e)(3)C)

### McKinney-Vento Act

# **Immediate Enrollment**



School of origin is defined as **"the school that a child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled, including a preschool"**. <u>42 USC1432(g)(3)(I)(i).</u>

We have a family that recently lost housing and will be moving in with a friend temporarily. The parent doesn't think about notifying anyone about their loss of housing at the Purple Elementary School District where their child has been attending school.

One day, on the way to work, the parent sees the Blue Elementary School District and decides that they want to enroll their child there.

Upon arrival at the Blue Elementary School District and is provided enrollment documents. The parent returns to the counter with the completed documents and that's when the registrar discovers that the address the parent provided is not in their boundaries.

The registrar then asks the parent if they are seeking open enrollment at Blue Elementary School District because it appears that the address provided doesn't fall into their district's boundaries.


The parent advises the registrar that they understood that if they are experiencing homelessness, they have the right to enroll at any school they choose to. The parent shared how they work around the corner from Blue Elementary School District. And they want their child to be immediately enrolled based on their homelessness. Upon further review of the documents the registrar notes that the Student Residency Questionnaire indicates the family is experiencing homelessness.

The registrar takes time to review the information the parent provided and shares with the parent additional support by explaining the school enrollment options based on their homeless experience and the McKinney-Vento Act.

- The **Purple Elementary School District** = school of origin
- Pink Elementary School District = local school where they're temporarily residing (school of residence)

The parent becomes upset and demands immediate enrollment.



# When do we share transportation with other LEAs?

"Each local educational agency **liaison** for homeless children and youths, designated under paragraph (1)(J)(ii), shall **ensure** that-

the parent or guardian of a homeless child or youth, and any unaccompanied youth, is **fully informed** of all **transportation services**, including transportation to the school of origin, as described in paragraph (1)(J)(iii), and is **assisted in accessing** transportation to the school that is selected under paragraph (3)(A);"

42 U.S.C. § 11432 (g)(6)(A)(viii)

### McKinney-Vento Statute

"Each local educational agency serving homeless children and youths that receives assistance under this part shall **coordinate**—

(i) the **provision of services** under this part with **local social services agencies** and **other** agencies or entities **providing services** to **homeless children and youths and their families**, including services and programs funded under the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act (42 U.S.C. 5701 et seq.); 1 and

(ii) **transportation**, transfer of **school records**, and other **interdistrict activities**, with other local educational agencies."

42 U.S.C. § 11432 (g)(5)(A)

### McKinney-Vento Act

### Coordination

"The McKinney-Vento Act strongly emphasizes the **importance** of **school** stability for homeless children and youths. Therefore, the McKinney-Vento Act calls for LEAs to **maintain** students in their **school** of **origin** to promote school stability and greater educational outcomes overall, **unless** it is **not** in the student's **best interest**. LEAs must make school placement determinations on the basis of the "best interest" of the homeless child or youth based on student-centered factors."

42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(B)]

### McKinney-Vento Act

#### Best Interest Determination (BID)





Permanent Housing



The student was enrolled at **Purple Elementary School District** when their family was last permanently housed.

- Loss of housing occurs or notification that the child or youth is experiencing homelessness
- Parent or guardian of a homeless child or youth, and any unaccompanied youth, is fully informed of all transportation services, including transportation to the school of origin



Temporary Housing



The family is temporarily housed in **Pink Elementary School District.** 



#### Purple Elementary School District School of origin





- Parent requests school of origin
- The local educational agency presumes or determines that keeping the child or youth in the school of origin is in the child or youth's best interest
- Enrollment at the local attendance area is not determined to be in the best interest of the child or youth

Pink Elementary School District Local attendance area school (school of residence)



The student was enrolled at **Purple Elementary School District** when their family was last permanently housed.

#### To ensure school **stability**

- School of origin initiates shared transportation request
- Transportation is coordinated
  - collaboratively

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- expeditiously and
- costs are **shared equally**
- Transportation mode
  - meets the needs of the family and is based on the best interest and safety of the student

## How will my district or school know if it will be monitored by the Arizona Homeless Education Program and how can we be prepared?

"The **State Education Agency** (SEA) is required to **monitor** Local Education Agencies (LEAs) in **collaboration** with **local McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaisons** to ensure compliance with the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act."

20 U.S.C. 6312 §1112(b)(6)

### **ESEA Statute**

"The **Coordinator** for Education of Homeless Children and Youths in each state must:

(5) Provide **technical assistance** and **monitor** LEAs, in **coordination** with **LEA liaisons** (under subsection (g)(1)(J)(ii)), to ensure they comply with subsection (e)(3) and paragraphs (3) through (7) of subsection (g)."

42 U.S.C. § 11432(f)(5)


### McKinney-Vento Statute



#### U.S. Department of Education

Statutes and related funding that establish requirements of State and Local Homeless Education Programs.

Provides guidance and conducts monitoring of all State Homeless Education Programs.



Ensures compliance with all federal requirements and monitoring elements. Establishes state requirements and conducts monitoring of Local Homeless Education Programs.

Ensures compliance with all federal and state requirements and monitoring elements.

# Who will be monitored?

- All Local Educational Agencies, including Charters
  - Non-subgrantees
  - Subgrantees
    - Title I
    - Education for Homeless Children and Youth (EHCY)

# When will I be notified of monitoring?

LEAs selected for monitoring will receive advanced notice via email.

#### This notification will be sent to the

 McKinney Vento Liaison, the LEA Authorized Representative, the LEA Entity Authorized Signer, and the LEA Business Manager.

Please be on the lookout for this email in the coming months.

# How can I prepare for monitoring?

- The Arizona Department of Education will be looking for evidence that Local Educational Agencies are **compliant** with:
  - McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act
  - Arizona Elementary and Secondary Education Act Consolidated State Plan, including...
    - Use of the Arizona Student Residency Questionnaire and the Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths



# **Data Reporting Requirements**

#### • LEAs must report all students identified to be experiencing homelessness

If a student qualifies, but denies services, the student must be reported by the LEA for the SY

#### Required data reporting elements

- Primary nighttime residence
- Unaccompanied homeless youth status
  - Not in the physical custody of a parent or court-appointed guardian

#### • LEAs must ensure data accuracy by:

- Maintaining data in an internal tracking sheet
- Uploading student data accurately and regularly into the student information system
  - Students in Foster Care do not meet the definition of homelessness and are **NOT** included in homeless children and youth data
- Verifying accurate reporting to AzEDS by comparing the AzEDS data reports against the internal tracking sheet

- Pre-integrity Live data
- Reports data immediately after submission

- Post-integrity
- Data in report is refreshed each night

#### INTEG15 Report - Coming Soon!

- Post-integrity
- Provides descriptions why the HEP data submitted to Arizona Department of Education did not pass integrity rules
- Data in report is refreshed each night




