

"Each local educational agency liaison for homeless children and youths, designated under paragraph (1)(J)(ii), shall ensure that homeless children and youth (including preschool-aged children and unaccompanied homeless youth) are **identified** by school personnel through **outreach** and **coordination** activities with other **entities** and **agencies**."

McKinney-Vento Act

Liaison Responsibility: Outreach and Coordination "If applicable, each State educational agency and local educational agency...shall **coordinate** with **State** and **local housing agencies** responsible for developing the comprehensive housing affordability strategy described in section 12705 of this title to **minimize educational disruption** for children and youths who become homeless."

"The coordination...shall be designed to— (i) ensure that all homeless children and youths are **promptly identified**;


(iii) raise the awareness of school personnel and service providers of the effects of short-term stays in a shelter and other challenges associated with homelessness."

Professional Development Community Partners

"To meet the needs of homeless students, local liaisons must have a diverse network of collaborative partners, as students experiencing homelessness have many needs beyond what schools have the ability to address on their own. Assisting families through referrals for additional services, such as housing, medical, dental, and social services, can increase stability and ensure students are ready to learn when they reach the classroom."

Guidance for Utilizing the Arizona Student Residency Questionnaire and The Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths

As outlined in the <u>Arizona ESEA Consolidated State Plan</u>, local education agencies (LEAs), including charters, in the State of Arizona are **required** to utilize the <u>Arizona Student Residency Questionnaire</u> and <u>The Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths</u>. Please reference the following guidance to ensure compliance with statutory requirements when developing these required documents.

Requirements to Ensure Statutory Compliance when Developing Required Documents

- LEAs must convert the Arizona Student Residency Questionnaire and The Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths documents into an editable format to make required modifications. Please reference the Instructions for Converting Sample Documents for LEA Use resource for assistance with this process.
- LEA modifications to the Arizona Student Residency Questionnaire must follow the following guidelines:
 - Replace the Arizona Department of Education Homeless Education logo with the LEA's logo.
 - Add any additional questions that may enhance the LEA's ability to identify students experiencing homelessness.
 - Add any additional information that may be pertinent for individuals completing this form to be aware of.
 - Do NOT modify or remove any existing questions, information, or elements.
- LEA modifications to The Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths must follow the following guidelines:
 - LEAs may NOT omit or withhold access to information about all of the rights as outlined in the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. The Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths resource was developed to include information about all of the rights within the law, therefore LEAs may NOT omit of any of the information included.
 - Fill in all information requested for the LEA Homeless Liaison in the designated space. Do NOT remove the State Homeless Education Program Coordinator information.


Statutory Requirements

- Provision of both the Student Residency Questionnaire and The Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths is required at any time enrollment is requested and twice annually (<u>42 U.S.C. § 11432 (q)(3)</u>).
- LEAs may not require completion of the Student Residency Questionnaire for enrollment or eligibility determinations, as doing so may impose a barrier to the identification, immediate enrollment, and retention of students experiencing homelessness (42 U.S.C. § 11432 (q)(1)()).
- Parents, guardians, caregivers, and youth must be provided the opportunity to complete the Student Residency Questionnaire and access the accompanying Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths at any point in the year (42 U.S.C. § 11432 (g)(1)()).


Step 1: Homeless Determination

• Conduct the **interview**, take detailed **notes**, and make a **determination**.

• Step 2: Assessment of Need Planning Guide

• Assess the student and family needs to begin providing and arranging services.

Tools for Collaboration



- Establish a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
 - <u>SchoolHouse Connection Samples</u>
 <u>Available</u>
- Establish a <u>Consent to Release of</u> <u>Information</u> (ROI)
- Utilize the <u>LEA Collaborations with</u> <u>Community-Based Organizations</u> document to track all collaborations you have in place

During the conversation, the liaison learns the following about the two children in the family who are enrolled in schools in the district. The parents express a desire to keep their children at their schools of origin. Transportation will be needed for both children.

Child 1:

- High school
- In marching band
- Special Education/IEP
- The school of origin is located in in the neighboring LEA
- Has been attending the school for three years

Child 2:

- Elementary school
- Special Education/IEP
- The school of origin is in a neighboring LEA
- Has been attending the school for one year

Additionally, the liaison also learns that the housing plan for this family includes a 90-day emergency shelter stay with a transitional housing option or voucher.

Throughout the conversation, the liaison is analyzing all the details that were provided, such as:

- the housing plan
- duration of time left in the school year
- distance of travel and the impact it may have on the child
- safety of the child
- academic factors
- extra-curricular factors
- length of enrollment at the school of origin

In alignment with requirements, the liaison makes an eligibility determination and reviews the following with the parents **on the phone**:

- Both students qualify for McKinney-Vento services.
- The high school child will continue enrollment at the school of origin and transportation will be coordinated.
- The liaison informs the parents that the elementary school child will need to be enrolled at the school in the attendance area. The liaison expresses that this appears to be in the best interest of the child.
- The liaison emails a copy of the written notification of eligibility determination and school placement to the parents following the phone call.

LEAs are required to provide a **written** notification of eligibility determination and school placement.

The written notice should include information about the ability to **dispute** the determination and should be accompanied by a copy of the **Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youth**. "The **parent** or **guardian** of the child or **youth** or (in the case of an unaccompanied youth) the youth shall be **provided** with a **written explanation** of any **decisions** related to school selection or enrollment made by the school, the local educational agency, or the State educational agency involved, including the **rights** of the parent, guardian, or unaccompanied youth to **appeal** such decisions.



Managing Disputes Filing an Appeal

With help from the McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaison, the parents file an appeal.

During the process, they complete a form that allows space to express their concerns and explain why they want their child in elementary school to remain enrolled at their school of origin.

The child or youth shall be **immediately enrolled** in the school in which enrollment is sought, pending final resolution of the dispute. Additionally, transportation shall be arranged expeditiously to **ensure full participation**. "If a **dispute** arises over eligibility, school selection, or enrollment, the LEA must **immediately enroll** the homeless student in the school in which enrollment is sought, **pending final resolution of the dispute**, including all available appeals."

"The McKinney-Vento Act strongly emphasizes the **importance** of **school** stability for homeless children and youths. Therefore, the McKinney-Vento Act calls for LEAs to **maintain** students in their **school** of **origin** to promote school stability and greater educational outcomes overall, **unless** it is **not** in the student's **best interest**. LEAs must make school placement determinations on the basis of the "best interest" of the homeless child or youth based on student-centered factors."

The McKinney-Vento Act requires that a child or youth experiencing homelessness attend:

- School of ongen: School of origin is defined as 'the school that a child or youth attended when
 permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was lead enrolled, including a
 proschool". Further, when the child or youth completes the final grade level served by the school of
 origin, the term school of origin shall include the designated receiving school at the next grade level
 for all feeder schools (42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(I).
- Local etiendence area school: Local attendance area school is defined as "any public school that outprovides statement which live in the attendance area in which the child or youth is actually living are eligible to attend" [42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(4)(6)].

Whether the child or youth will attend the school of ongin or the local attendence area school enrollment should take place immediately.

Best Interest Determinations (BIDs) Analyzing Information

The McKinney-Vento Homeless conducts the BID by talking to each individual that on the list provided. Here is the information they gathered:

- When the McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaison speaks with the principal, they don't agree the student should remain enrolled because they've only been there a year, and the principal feels strongly that they should enroll in their neighborhood school.
- The McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaison learns more from the special education teacher and classroom teacher about the student's need for specialized instruction, and how successful they are doing academically and socially.
- The McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaison considers that the family's housing plan includes an additional move within the next 90 days which is non-negotiable. There is no solid plan for where they'll move next.
- The transportation department advises the McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaison that they don't feel that transporting the student to their school of origin is cost-effective. Furthermore, the sharing district has informed the transportation department that they don't have any drivers available and

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaison must provide a new written notification of eligibility and enrollment as well as written explanation of the dispute-related decision. "The **parent** or **guardian** of the child or **youth** or (in the case of an unaccompanied youth) the youth shall be **provided** with a **written explanation** of any **decisions** related to school selection or enrollment made by the school, the local educational agency, or the State educational agency involved, including the **rights** of the parent, guardian, or unaccompanied youth to **appeal** such decisions.



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



LEA vs LEA State Level Dispute Resolution Procedure

- To initiate the state level dispute resolution process, the following must occur within seven (7) workdays after receipt of the written notification of the decision made at the district level or interdistrict decision. The LEA must submit the LEA vs LEA Dispute Resolution form found on the ADE HEP website. Then, forward the following to the Arizona Department of Education, Office of Homeless Education.
 - 1. A copy of the LEAs written decision
 - 2. Additional supporting documentation necessary (optional)
- 2. Upon receipt of a notice of appeal, the Homeless Education Director shall, within seven (7) workdays, convene a panel of at least two (2) Arizona Department of Education employees, including the State Coordinator for Homeless Education, Director, and an additional department employee.

3. This panel shall review the entire record of the dispute and decide what is in the best interest of the child or youth. Within seven (7) workdays of the date the panel convenes, the Arizona Department of Education will issue this decision in writing.

4. The **determination** of the panel shall be **final**.

16. Instructions

To initiate the state level dispute resolution process, the following must occur within seven (7) workdays after receipt of the written notification of the decision made by the LEA.

The LEA must email the following items to the Arizona Department of Education, Office of Homeless Education.

Please follow these steps:

1. Draft an email to homeless@azed.gov.

2. In the subject line of the email include the following text, "Dispute Resolution-Name of your LEA".

3. Attach a copy of the LEAs written decision to the email.

4. Attach additional supporting documentation necessary (optional).
